Dear Assistant Attorney General Delrahim,

I am writing today concerning the proposed termination of the consent decree in *United States v. Association of Casualty and Surety Companies, et al.* In August of 2019, the Department of Justice proposed a review of around 1,300 antitrust judgments enacted without sunset dates. I have heard directly from concerned constituents who expressed to me that this particular consent decree helps to maintain fair competition in the automobile repair shop business by keeping a more competitive environment in an industry where insurance companies have the ability to unduly influence every aspect of the repair process.

Eliminating this agreement might jeopardize consumer automotive protections by prompting the price incentive to use the lowest cost replacement parts, regardless of quality. The absence of this consent decree would create a situation where price fixing for auto repair claims becomes the unfettered norm. Customers would be deprived a competitive market where both a fair price and high quality would be the determining factors of their business. Instead the consumer market would be driven to only those repair shops who cater most closely to the will of large insurance companies.

I encourage the Department of Justice to review each of the consent decrees that do not have a sunset and make a just determination on each one. Eliminating this consent decree will only encourage the anticompetitive behavior that precipitated its enactment in the first place. I believe the measures allotted by this particular consent decree make its continuation a necessary decision.
